Pyometra

Making you aware of as many conditions as possible that could affect your pets' health, may help you recognise a problem in its early stage. Obtaining advice or any necessary treatment contributes greatly towards helping your pet recover, and remain healthy to enjoy a happy life with you. Some conditions are fairly minor and need little treatment, while others are of a more serious nature that require immediate veterinary care, like **Pyometra**. This condition can occur in those female pets that have not yet been neutered. A simple description of pyometra is an infection of the uterus (womb), however it is a complicated and serious problem that does require urgent treatment.

What is Pyometra? The womb fills with infectious pus like material. This can be due to various problems such as cysts, a build up of mucus and bacteria inside the uterus, an infection or a hormonal imbalance. Toxins (poison) from the pus inside the womb are released, and enter the blood stream making your pet very ill.

Symptoms of Pyometra.

If your pet shows any of these signs contact your vet without delay.

**Vaginal Discharge Loss of Appetite
Excessive Drinking Lethargy and Depression
Vomiting Swelling of the Abdomen**

The sooner treatment can begin the better.

Treatment If pyometra is suspected, we may take blood tests and x-rays to assist us in diagnosing the condition. Once confirmed, treatment can begin, but sometimes a pet is so poorly that an immediate hysterectomy operation is required.

Neutering your Pet If you are not planning to allow your pet to have puppies or kittens, then perhaps you should consider having them neutered. Not only will this prevent pyometra but also other related conditions such as ovarian cysts, mammary tumours, cancer and of course unwanted pregnancies.




Winter Wonderland The colder season is fast approaching, so please remember our beautiful birds and other wildlife that brace the winter elements. They all need some extra help to survive, so feed birds daily during harsh weather. For our prickly hedgehog friends, please do not feed milk as hedgehogs are lactose intolerant. Provide mealworms and special hedgehog food; tinned meat cat food is also suitable. Ensure a good supply of fresh drinking water too for our wildlife.



Ho Ho Ho and A Kiss Under The Mistletoe!

Ancient druids and Norse Mythology tell stories of this seasonal plant, but the truth is that fresh or dried mistletoe and berries contain substances that are **toxic for your pet**. Poinsettias and holly/berries can also cause problems. If any are ingested, this can cause a range of **signs such as skin, mouth and throat irritation, swelling, excessive drooling, vomiting, lip licking, and diarrhoea**. **Do not delay in contacting your vet for advice.**



What's Cooking in the Kitchen?

Foods that are prepared in advance of Christmas such as the cake and puddings, require a lot of raisins and sultanas!

Unfortunately, **these and also fresh grapes can be toxic** to dogs and if ingested can cause kidney failure. Store grapes or any foods containing raisins and sultanas (don't forget the mince pies) well out of your pet's reach! **Chocolate** should also be stored carefully, as it contains theobromine, which is toxic to our pets. **Recognise any signs of restlessness, vomiting, diarrhoea, lethargy, stomach pain or reluctance to eat?.....then contact a vet quickly!**

Turkey Troubles! It seems to be turkey for dinner for days..... and when you really can't eat another turkey recipe, please do not feed carcass bones to your pets. **When broken they are sharp** and can get lodged in the throat and stomach to cause serious injury.



Ringworm.....

Another Wiggly Worm?

Some pet owners hear the word worms, and it can send a shudder down their spine! Wiggly intestinal worms are a parasite problem that can arise in your pets, which needs to be dealt with quickly, better still prevented. However, let us not get confused here as **ringworm**, is not your usual kind of 'internal worm' that we talk about.

Ringworm on your pet is **a type of fungus**, which infects the skin of cats, dogs and even us humans.

How is ringworm transmitted?

From direct contact with an infected animal, which can also shed fungi spores that are able to survive for long periods of time in the environment. Your pet could catch ringworm from anywhere that another infected animal has been.

What you should look out for

A small round bald patch, which may have scaly skin in the middle or small spots.

Sometimes this causes irritation for your pet, so watch out for scratching/nibbling.

Don't Panic!

Ringworm is fairly easy to diagnose and treat. We can use a special light, which shows the fungus as a glowing fluorescent colour. Alternatively we may take a hair sample from around the infected area to study under a microscope, or gather a little of the scaly skin to enable us to grow a culture. If your pet is diagnosed with ringworm, a suitable course of treatment may be prescribed.

It is a good idea to regularly check your pet's skin and coat for any unusual signs or changes. If you do find something that you would like us to check out, please do not hesitate to contact the surgery for an appointment.
